Tips for a Panorama

- 1. Take your time and pick a scene. Try to visualize how you want the panorama to look.
- 2. Shoot RAW.
- 3. Use a <u>level</u> tripod. Set the head up so you can pan without tilting the camera in any way.
- 4. Use manual controls
- No auto ISO
- 6. Auto color balance is OK, as long as you shoot RAW.
- 7. No polarizer
- 8. Try using your camera in a vertical position.
- 9. Overlap your images by 30% to 50%. Use 50% if you are using a wide angle lens.
- 10. Use a small aperture, f16 is good.
- 11. Don't take too much time, but don't rush.
- 12. Try practicing you pan, so you know where you want to start and end the pan. Make sure you are also practicing the overlaps between shots.
- 13. Use a cable release so you can take steady shots.
- 14. If I am trying more panoramic attempts, I take a shot with my hand over the lens so know where a series ends and starts.
- 15. Make sure your depth of field is good for the lens you are using. A fuzzy foreground or background can ruin a panorama.

Post Processing

- 1. If you are using Lightroom, process your first photo in the panorama to your liking, and then sync the other photos to the settings you used.
- You can also stitch the photos together in Lightroom.
